

TIGER'S PELT IS NAILED TO THE WALL BY VICTORIOUS PIRATES

TAMED TIGERS EAT FROM THE HAND OF ADAMS

"Babe" the Pitching Hero of Baseball World--"Jump Through Here!" and They Did-- The Mighty German Shows Cobb Up--The Marvel Falls Flat--Fans Shiver but Are Game

Detroit, Oct. 16.—Pittsburg's Pirates are world's champions for the season of 1909. Before a crowd of 18,000 shivering and saddened fans, the National league's premiers, at Bennett park this afternoon, showed clearly and conclusively how completely they outclass the best diamond combination of which the American league can boast.

It was Adams who officiated in two previous decisive victories over Detroit, but he topped all former performances yesterday. The cold weather, high wind and hard work proved too much for Jennings' best slabsman. Descriptive Donovan was wild, and the mighty Miller, easily picking, but Adams, master of the situation, had the Tigers thoroughly tamed.

Wagner played a remarkable game today. I never saw the big "Wag" to better territory before. He was all over the field, throwing perfect. Every drive he got to be handled cleanly, and he came to the front with a clean-up wallp down the left field alley for the only three-bagger of the world's series. Yes, sir, Hans made good. Tonight about three of every four Detroit fans who have come out of it are willing to concede Honus to be the wonder of baseball and Ty Cobb's superior.

The Pirates got away to an early lead on the Tigers. Donovan was wild from the first inning without being scored upon. In the second Adams' walk and steal, Wilson's fly, Adams' pass to first, Hyatt's battle, and passes to Leach and Clarke, netted two runs, the second tally being forced over the plate.
