

A ROW IN ST. LOUIS.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 15.—The game between the Browns and Chicagos here to-day broke up in a row in the ninth inning. Sullivan's umpiring was very unsatisfactory to the home club, he making several very bad decisions against them. In the sixth inning play was suspended for some time by a "kick" over one of his decisions in giving Kelly safe when he was clearly out. Later on, after a ball which hit outside the foul line, but rolled inside before it reached first, had been declared foul, it was given safe, letting in a run, and Comiskey called his men off the field. Sullivan claims it was not he, but Anson, who called out foul. Sullivan made no decision of the game on the grounds, but gave it to Chicago to-night at the hotel by a score of 9 to 0. The Browns claim the decision will not stick, as it should have been made on the grounds.
