'Satchel' Paige Allows How He'll Whip Big League Aces Here Tomorrow

Colored Star At Oak Ball Park

"What's your best pitch?" "Satchel" Paige, the elongated Negro pitching star, didn't hesitate to answer.

"My fast ball," he replied.

Which, in itself, is no surprise. Many hurlers are blessed with a torrid fast ball. Some bring it over-handed, some side-armed. From where does "Satchel" Paige deliver his fastest ball?

"From all angles," he said with great nonchalance.

Tomorrow this same Paige and his wicked fast one will be stationed in mid-diamond at the Oakland ball park to oppose Dick Bartell's expensive collection of big league stars. This game, which starts at 2:15 p. m., will be "Satchel's" first appearance in northern California.

Toughest Game

"It also will be my toughest game," said Paige pointedly. "You never before have I faced so many great hitters in one game. I've faced teams with three or four big busters—but a whole club of them—this isn't going to be easy.

However, I expect to whip 'em."

The most dangerous menace to "Satchel's" record of not having been beaten since 1914 is Eddie Lombardi, Cleveland catcher, who was the fourth best slinger in the National League last season with 242.

Others are Charlie Rohr, Pittsburgh, first base; Harry Larragon, Pittsburgh, second base; Bartell, Giants, shortstop; Johnny Verres, Pacific, third base; and a coalition of George Burns, Chico Joe DiMaggio, St. Louis, and Red Harry, Pacific. Pitchers will be Johnny Ebbert of Brooklyn and Tony Frates of the City Club.

He's the Card

Yet, despite the brilliant array of big busters, "Satchel" Paige remains unchallenged as the major ac-

traction of tomorrow's show.

He is the man who stopped Tommy Bridges and "Schoolboy" Rowe of the world champion Detroit Tigers, whipped the talkative "Rock" Navetta of Washington and told "Dixie" Dean (at "Dixie's" request) how to put a hop on his fast ball.

Since the close of last season Paige has pitched 17 exhibition games—and won 17 of them! Big league stars residing in southern California have regularly emerged from their retirement in an effort to hold "Satchel's" amazing string of victories. Each time the major hurlers have regretted their actions.

Outsmarts Gehrig

Among the outstanding sluggers against whom Paige has tested his

arm are "Pepper" Martin, Frank Demaree, Lou Gehrig, Charlie Gehring, the Waners, "Hack" Wilson and hosts of others. Of these, he terms Gehring the toughest to derive.

"Gehrig," he makes haste to add, "is a powerful hitter. But he can be fooled."

A statement which few American league hurlers would venture to make, for fear Lombardini, Lou, would plague them to the end of their pitching careers.

"Pepper" Martin, he continued, "Now he's a real hitter, too. He hits 'em hard and sharp and on the line. He gave me some trouble a while back. He got a hold of my curve and gave it a good hard ride. It was a single."

Paige was asked if he suffered trouble in beating Martin on base.

It will be recalled "Pepper" ran the bags at will in the world series of 1921.

Watch Martin

"I thought of that," said Paige, "when Martin was on first base, I had two strikes on the hitter and there were two outs. From the corner of my eye I saw 'Pepper' moving off and starting for second—and so I put a little extra special on the pitch and struck out the batter."

While his fame generally rests upon his fast ball, "Satchel" also is reputed for his curve. This, he admits, is the pitch it takes to make Lou Gehrig behave.

Paige comes to Oakland with his own personal catcher, Abel Brooks. Abel is one of the few who is able to handle what the "Satchel" throws.
